


OUR VALUES





FIELDWORK

CEHD students completed fieldwork at over **60** private and community organizations and over **175** PreK-12 schools. **92%** of organizations and schools are located within the local five-county area.

SCHOOL DISTRICT OF PHILADELPHIA

192 Temple University students served as student teachers in the 2022-23 academic year. **40%** of SDP student teachers approved for the teacher talent pool for the 2023-24 academic year were from the population of Temple student teachers.

RE-EMERGING AS LEADER IN URBAN EDUCATION

Nearly 150 years ago, Temple University was founded by Russell Conwell to provide superior educational opportunities for academically talented and highly motivated students, regardless of their backgrounds or means. Since its establishment, the College of Education and Human Development has been a testament to this vision, a beacon of excellence, cultivating networks of civically-minded researchers and practitioners to enhance educational opportunities for urban students and communities locally in Philadelphia and beyond.

In fall 2024, the college welcomed a cohort of students for its new master's in urban education and policy program, with a renewed focus on fostering hope and implementing sustainable change.

PROVIDING ACCESS THROUGH TEMPLE EDUCATION SCHOLARS



Fourteen high school seniors were celebrated in June 2024 as they completed the Temple Education Scholars dual enrollment program. All were admitted to Temple University, with four planning to major in programs within the CEHD.

PSYCHOEDUCATIONAL CLINIC HELPS CLOSE A GAP

Throughout the city, the region and beyond, there is significant need for psychological and behavioral services for school-aged children. When a student's needs impact their learning, school and district psychologists and mental health professionals can offer a wide range of evaluations and services. But demand far exceeds the resources available.

The College of Education and Human Development helps address the gap through its Psychoeducational Clinic, which takes on individual clinical cases in Philadelphia and the surrounding area to help school districts meet demand.

Associate Professor of Practice Jessica Reinhardt explains the two primary goals are: low-cost psychoeducational evaluations for the community, and to be a gold-star training site for school psychology students.


PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT AND ENGAGEMENT

Our faculty and students were featured in over 60 sessions during the 2024 American Educational Research Association (AERA) annual meeting, and nearly two dozen sessions during the 2024 50th Annual Convention of the Association for Behavior Analysis International, both of which took place in Philadelphia. The college also hosted its 43rd Annual School Psychology, Counseling Psychology and Applied Behavior Analysis Conference, featuring keynote speaker John Murphy.
